Key Facts about the UCAS Scheme (1)

- 'Invisibility' each Uni. is only aware of its own application.
- Maximum of 5 choices
- Simultaneous consideration (except for Art & Design Route B)
- Conditional offers 2 can be held
- August confirmation of offers
- £21 Registration Fee

Key Facts about the UCAS Scheme (2)

Some subject restrictions:

Dentistry, Medicine or Veterinary – max. 4 choices



Art & Design Route B - max. 3 choices

When to Apply

1 September to 15 January

(15 October for Oxford University, Cambridge University, Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Science/Medicine)


For Art & Design course

Route A 1 September to 15 January

Route B 1 January to 24 March

Filling in your Application

Every applicant has five sections to complete:

- Course
- Education
- Employment
- About you
- Personal statement

Listing your courses and institutions

Your education details

Your employment details

Your personal details

Personal Statement (1)

What's special about the personal statement?

It's the <u>only</u> part of the application where you have the opportunity to bring yourself to life

- If done well, provided a 360% snapshot of the applicant
- Must be written in your own words (not lifted off the internet!)

Personal Statement (2)

What's it for?

Amplifies your academic achievement

 Opportunity to explain more about your current studies (for example, you are taking statistics as part of AS Maths)

Personal Statement (3)

What should go into it?

Plenty of solid evidence to tell HE selector what you're like:

Level of commitment and motivation Self-reliant and well-organised Interested in and aptitude for subject Good team-worker



Personal Statement (4)

How should it be written?

- Structured
- Clear, concise, precise
- Avoid waffle and inappropriate language (it's not a phone text message!)

The Importance of the Reference

Who will write it for me?

- The reference will be written by a member of staff at your school or college
- Many schools and colleges are happy to show you what they intend to write about you.

My application has been sent to UCAS, what happens next?

UCAS will send you an acknowledgement

 Copies of your application will be speedily sent to your choices

www.ucastrack.service

ucastrack

- Allows you to view your own record
- 24 hours 7 days per week access
- Shows choices, offers, personal information
- Password on Acknowledgement letter
- Can use it to reply to offers

Clearing

- Operates in late August/September
- Gives you a final chance if you have not been placed anywhere
- Vacancy information in newspapers and on the web
- You have to take the initiative to contact an HEI which has vacancies

UCAS EXTRA

An opportunity to submit more single applications if you have been unsuccessful in your other choices.

Adjustment

Applicants who get better results than expected for firm choice can reconsider where and what to study
